FROM THE PASTORS PEN

GNP: Good Neighbor *Parking!*

In our apartment complex each unit is designated two reserved tandem parking spots in the garage below the complex. These spots are *tight* and take quite a lot of maneuvering to squeeze into. And so, any time my husband is on a business trip in which he has taken his car, I simply park smack in the middle of our two spots. Mid December, he was unexpectedly able to get home early from one of these business trips, and at 4:00am none-the-less. Upon seeing that my car was taking up both of our spaces, he chose to park in a spot reserved for our next-door neighbor. He felt safe doing this since he knew that our neighbors -- an elderly woman whose mobility is rather impaired and her adult son who is mentally handicapped -- did not have a car. In fact, we've never seen a car in their reserved spot. The plan was to shift the cars once I was awake and functioning (definitely not a trait I possess at 4:00am!)

Our plan did not work. Around 10:00am when we went down to the parking garage to re-arrange the cars, there was a note tucked in the driver's door handle of my husband's car. Our neighbors had had family come visit to help them run errands. And the family member was incredibly (and understandably) upset that a car was in their spot, forcing them to find street parking in a busy neighborhood and forcing our elderly neighbor to laboriously walk to that street spot.

In every other instance of my life, when I am harshly confronted by someone who is upset with me (even if I am *completely* to blame), I immediately become defensive and think of how unreasonable they are being. But in this instance my heart sank and I wanted nothing more than to let this family member know how sorry we were.

And so, we wrote a letter explaining what had happened and why we had parked in their spot. We explained that it was not done cavalierly, but that regardless of the situation, it was still wrong. We explained that since moving to our complex this past Summer we have felt so blessed to be neighbors with their family and that we appreciate their kindness and warmth. The next time we saw a car parked in their spot, we left that note in the driver's door handle.

Two weeks later, my husband and I delivered a plate of Christmas cookies to each of our neighbors (a tradition that he grew up enjoying with his family and has brought to ours). And when we knocked on the door of Unit C, it was the visiting family member who answered the door. When we introduced ourselves and she realized we were the same neighbors from the parking debacle, she broke down in tears. She told us how deeply touched she was to receive our note, and how much it meant to her to know that her mother and brother, both of whom she worries about due to their limitations, have neighbors who are intentionally showing kindness to them.

It would have been so easy for me to go off the handle over an accusatory note, but God was at work in my heart. It would have been so easy *not* to write a note in response, even if we *intended to*, but God was at work in our hearts. As a result, I feel God moving in and about our complex and neighbors.
